THE WORLD IN 1900



A Tour Around the World at the End of the Nineteenth Century in Words, Music, and Motion Pictures

Presented by Frank Gray (South East Screen Archive) and Luke McKernan (British Universities Film & Video Council). Music by Neil Brand.

The World in 1900 presents a tour around the world in motion pictures at the end of the Nineteenth Century and the close of the Victorian Era. Presented as if it were a programme compiled in January 1901, at the time of Queen Victoria's death, The World in 1900 takes us on a journey in films all dating from before the Queen's death: from the Queen's funeral, across the Channel into Europe, across the Mediterranean to Palestine and Egypt, then down to South Africa to the Anglo-Boer War, across the Indian Ocean to India, Singapore, and the Far East, crossing down to Australia, then back up to China in time for the Boxer Rebellion, over the Pacific to Canada, which we cross by rail, thence to the Edison studio at West Orange, next to New York City, then down to Cuba for the Spanish-American War, over the Atlantic to Ireland, then back to Britain to catch a flavour of the Modern Age to come.

The compilation is listed below by individual film titles, with producer, country, date and lengths per item. All films are silent and held on 35mm compilation reels. The total running time of the programme, with commentary, is approximately 80 minutes. All films come from the **BFI National Archive**.

Britain

Beginning with Queen Victoria and family at Balmoral, we see troops setting off for the Boer War, see films at an Edinburgh theatre, then take the first of several train journeys to a view of Britain at the time, stopping off at the Empire, Leicester Square to see the Cinématographe before watching the Epsom Derby of 1895, then setting sail at Southampton.

Journeying up to Kiel, we see a spectacular demonstration of the might of the German navy.

Moving down to Italy, we sail down the Grand Canal, receive the Pope's blessing, then see comedian Fregoli impersonate the great Italian conductors, and take in a view of Naples.

Again we cross the sea with Georges Méliès, this time experiencing an action during the Greco-Turkish war.
